Families swarm to new Messy Church!

When Rachael Gledhill, curate at St Barnabas in Dulwich, south London, decided to give Messy Church a go, little did she know what was about to happen!

'We started it in October 2020 between lockdowns, and the first thing we did was Messy Harvest. We had no idea what it would be like, but we advertised, and we thought we'd have 16 family bubbles round the hall. That doesn't seem very many, but we were amazed it booked up so quickly! So we thought, oh, well,

we'll offer a second one the following week. We'd found it so hard to minister to families during the pandemic and this seemed a good way to do something, and within 24 hours that was booked up too. So we thought, well, maybe we can offer a third one, and that was fully booked too, with a waiting list!'

Astonishing growth

Despite being in and out of lockdown, Messy Church really took off: 'From October 2020 to today, we've had over 300 families come through Messy Church, and 87% were unknown to us before.'

You might have seen this huge, vibrant Messy Church featured on *Songs of Praise*, 'The power of story' (BBC One, 23 January 2022). Why does Rachael think it's been such a success? 'I think people were just so desperate to have a connection to community,' she says, 'and that's what Messy Church offered them. And then they started to think, "Oh, is there something bigger?"'

Leading families on the path to faith

A team in East Sussex described how years of lovingly tending their Messy Church led to a 'cause of joy and celebration' for the whole congregation.

From zero to front row

'Luke and Samantha had no links with church as they grew up,' explains Angela, a member of the Messy Church team at St Stephen's, Bexhill-on-Sea. 'It was only when their first child, Reace, was a toddler, that Samantha sought out a support group and discovered Messy Church. She and the children started attending a midweek Messy Church, and when it moved to a Sunday morning, her husband Luke started coming too. On Christmas Day 2019 the whole family sat in the front row – it was such a joy to see them there! Now they feel very much part of the church family.'

A bouquet of blessings!

Samantha feels that Messy Church doesn't just provide fellowship for her, but has also helped both Reace (ten) and Isabella (six) grow in confidence. 'The children have even helped deliver the regular all-age church services – something Samantha would never have thought possible,' says Angela. After several years of experiencing this creative, inclusive ministry, in a landmark event for the church, Luke, Samantha and the children were all ready to be baptised this January.

'Two weeks later, two other mums and a child were baptised,' says Angela, acknowledging 'all the prayer and faithful ministry of the Messy Church team.'

'Now, Luke, Samantha, the two mums and one of the dads are preparing for confirmation' she adds. 'In one month we've seen a breathtaking series of Holy Spirit events in which the outreach of Messy Church has 'in-reached' to encourage and bless the whole church family!'

A weight off parents' shoulders

Mum Helena told us how the downto-earth Parenting for Faith course was helping her cultivate new, easier ways to show her daughter what it is to know God.

'She's sunny and fun and an explorer! Very compassionate and empathetic, with a calm nature.' Helena's joy was evident as she described three-year-old, Hope. Both attend a church toddler group in the Peak District, where church workers Rachel and Adam offered the Parenting for Faith course. It was an easy sell to a mum keen to know how to help children develop their own faith.

Gathering once a month over a meal, parents from half a dozen families have watched the course videos, shared thoughts and experiences and prayed for each other. 'It's a real mixture of people and backgrounds,' says Helena. 'But the leaders created a very safe environment,

and the down-to-earth videos have helped everyone open up.'

Valuable tools

And it's clearly making a difference: 'I could see parents beginning to be freed up – weight lifting off their shoulders: suddenly understanding their child's energy, seeing it as an opportunity, not a barrier; realising we don't all have to be the same. There's so much I could say... the tools are so valuable – and the opportunity to reflect on our own faith journey: thinking about what we'd like our children to do, or not do. You really want to take away what you've learned and put it into practice at home.'

Letting children in

'One example is how we're encouraging Hope to pray. Instead of "saying a prayer", we encourage her to talk to and connect with God. There's a massive shift in our language and approach – from head to heart knowledge. And we're more intentional about letting her into our relationship with God: for example, we include Hope in our quiet time. It felt weird to begin with – yet it's also the most obvious and sensible thing in the world – why wouldn't you?'

Would Helena recommend the Parenting for Faith course? 'Wholeheartedly! I've mentioned it to pretty much all my friends with kids – and to a couple of churches. I tell them "It's amazing – you should absolutely do it – and it's even free!"'

They've been able to share the range of what using Parenting for Faith tools looks like, in all sorts of families, churches and situations.'

Helping older people 'finish well'

Good gardeners use the end of the year for clearing up, pruning, repairing and planning. So too, Anna Chaplains tend spiritually to those in the autumn of their lives, helping them to 'finish well'. It's something God has laid on Debbie Gurling's heart, as this powerful example of her ministry reveals.

Forgiveness and freedom – after 50 years

One day Doreen confessed to Debbie her worries about dying. For 50 years she'd carried the guilt of 'breaking an important commandment', and as she approached the end of her life, was growing increasingly fearful of God's judgement. Gently reassuring her of God's forgiveness, Anna Chaplain Debbie was able to lead Doreen to lay this burden down before him in prayer.

'I thought she might pick it up again,' says Debbie, 'but she didn't. In the days and weeks afterwards, she kept saying how free she felt – that she couldn't even think of all the things that had been burdening her.'

'For me that was precious' adds Debbie, 'because it had been a barrier to her dying peacefully.'

'Trust doesn't happen easily or with everybody,' she reflects, 'Sometimes you know you're not going to get very far – and that's okay, because it's all about timing and being faithful. Not everyone's up for receiving it, so you just love who and when you can'.

Healing relationships

It wasn't only Doreen whose trust Debbie had earned. As she got to know Debbie, daughter Priscilla had begun to open up about her own struggles. As a carer, and the person closest to her mum, she often bore the brunt of Doreen's frustrations. She wasn't even sure her mother really loved her – Doreen was from a background and culture that made

saying so impossible. As her mother's illness progressed, Priscilla became increasingly distressed by the thought of losing her with this question unresolved.

So when the time was right, Debbie called upon her years of experience and Anna Chaplaincy training to gently broach the subject with Doreen. 'I told her how I, too, had grown up within that culture. And I explained how lovely it would have been to hear those words while my mother was still alive.'

'What would you like your daughter to know?'

After much prayer, one day Debbie took the plunge and arrived at Doreen's house with some stationery. 'What would you like your daughter to know, that you can't say face to face?' she asked. Writing down Doreen's words, she put the note into an envelope. Later she slid it into Priscilla's handbag, somewhat hesitantly. She needn't have worried. Priscilla was thrilled to discover the note and guessed Debbie had played a part: 'My mother would never have done this by herself!'

'Now, any time her mother is harsh to her,' says Debbie, 'Priscilla has in writing how she *really* feels – she knows she's really loved – and they both have peace.'

'That's what I mean by finishing well,' she adds. 'I feel that's my new call – praying for people to die well.'

God's word for all seasons

A family unites around scripture

When Andy Haynes chose a present for his family last Christmas, little did he know he

was preparing the soil for a new kind of connection!

Andy had been in the congregation at Kinver Methodist Church, when Holy Habits founder Andrew Roberts, who was preaching, mentioned that *The BRF Book of 365 Bible Reflections* would make a lovely present. It gave him an idea.

'Mum is 90 and she keeps saying "I don't want anything. I've got everything." So I went with Andrew's suggestion and ordered the book for myself, and one for Mum. When they came, I started flicking through and I thought others in the family would enjoy it. In the end I ordered seven copies.

'The first person I heard from was my daughter: "Thank you so much for this

book Dad," she said, "I find the Bible overwhelming, but this just gives me an understanding and it's great." I was thrilled. Then one of my sons suggested we form a family WhatsApp group, so from 1 January we've all been following the daily readings. And it's doing a lot for us as a family, bringing us together in a new way.'



Peace, as the earth shakes!

Caught up in New Zealand's catastrophic earthquakes of 2011, regular New Daylight

reader recalled that morning's reflection and dug deep to hold on to its promise.

In the recent episode of *Songs of Praise* featuring BRF's work, Alison Taylor, from Christchurch, New Zealand, shared how a particular reflection had brought her comfort in the midst of fear and uncertainty. A few days after the first earthquake, she had been in her prayer

group, discussing the day's reading from Matthew's gospel, telling how Jesus calmed the storm (Matthew 8:23–27).

Less than an hour later, Christchurch was hit with yet another terrible quake. As Alison recounted, 'As I took refuge under a rack of clothes in the shop I was passing through, I cried out to the Lord, in fear, to protect and save me and my family. I remembered what I had just read to the group and tried to trust Jesus.'

Alison held on to the hope that Jesus would calm the storm she was experiencing even in that very moment.

Writing to New Daylight author Amy Boucher-Pye in the days following the earthquakes, Alison concluded: 'The past three weeks have been difficult, and nothing is the same, but all our family are well and this has brought us closer to the Lord.'

For centuries, Christians yearning for intimacy with God have repeated the Jesus Prayer. A new BRF Centenary Classic introduces this deceptively simple prayer to new readers.

'Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me.'

This new BRF Centenary Classic edition of *The Jesus Prayer* by the late bishop of Coventry Simon Barrington-Ward, suggests how to use the prayer in

personal devotion, and opens up Bible passages that help us understand it.

In his introduction, the author expresses the hope that 'the book will help many... to be drawn into a deeper communion with God... to the secret of unceasing prayer... that continues day and night, while we are working, eating, meeting with each other and even while we sleep.'
