# So much to be thankful for as our centenary year draws to a close



As the end of 2022 approaches, I've been reflecting on the past year as we've marked BRF's centenary. I'm so thankful that we've been able to celebrate the milestone at all after two years of challenge and uncertainty, though of course that sense of challenge and uncertainty has been reignited with the sad death of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II.

BRF enjoyed a close bond with Queen Elizabeth's mother. We were honoured to have her as our patron for many years and her presence at our silver and golden jubilee celebrations has been recalled in words and pictures throughout 2022.

The year began with *Songs of Praise*. It was a pleasure to work with the *Songs of Praise* team on the programme they broadcast back in January, and we were thrilled at the way they featured aspects of our ministries to illustrate the theme of 'The power of the Bible to transform lives'. We know of several people whose journey to becoming an Anna Chaplain began with watching that episode.

We learned so much about online worship during the pandemic and put those lessons to excellent use in our own online service of thanksgiving and rededication in April. To date this has been viewed almost 1,200 times – a far greater number than would have been able to attend such an event in person had we followed the pattern of previous anniversary services in St Paul's and Westminster Abbey.

We were particularly delighted to publish *The BRF Book of 365 Bible Reflections* as we launched the centenary year, and we've loved the positive feedback we've had from readers. One person told me how much she's enjoyed discovering just how many of the contributors she knows or has met. 'It's like hearing from old friends,' she said.

It has been a real joy, too, to hear stories of people whose lives have been impacted by BRF, particularly those who have been faithfully reading our Bible reading notes for many years. One of my favourites is a letter I received from a subscriber at the start of the year, enclosing a cheque for £73 as a special donation – £1 for every year he had been reading BRF notes. Being introduced to the notes as a child established for him a habit of a lifetime.

What a year! There's so much to be thankful for, especially you, our supporters, for being with us. We couldn't do what we do without you.

# 'The stories were the best!'

Former teacher Alison Sutton is the evangelist at LifeChurch in Warrington. Married to Colin and with three children under four, she's been running the Parenting for Faith course for the first time with her mums' group, trialling the resources for a possible roll-out across the five different congregations which make up the 400-strong LifeChurch.

'We're all a little bit nervous, I think, that our kids are going to get sucked in by the world,' Alison says, 'and some of the group have been leaning towards home educating. We all want our kids to be

saved, obviously, but sometimes we don't know how to get the balance right between how much of it is our responsibility and how

much it is the sovereignty of God. I don't want to mollycoddle them to the point where they don't see the world.'

#### Tackling the tough questions

'My hope for the Parenting for Faith course is that it's going to show us the best way through all those questions,' she says. 'One of the best bits of the course for me so far was the second week, when it was about how to frame things. I've been doing that instinctively, but it's a nice confirmation that it's the right thing to do.'

Alison likes having the handbooks to make notes in. 'That makes things stick in my mind,' she says. 'I also like the choppiness of going from the DVD to

discussion, then back to the DVD, then to an activity. It's not just staring at the screen for 45 minutes then having a little discussion at the end. It's back and forth and

you get very engaged. It's deepening the parents' faith, and giving them tools to relate to their children in a spiritual way.'



'The stories were the best of all, especially in week 4,' she says. 'The testimony of the boy who felt the "Father's hand" on him! Some of us cried. These were really important and added weight to what Rachel was saying.'



# Tears of blessing: Messy Church reborn



Karen Hopwood-Owen became vicar of St Mary's, Ellenbrook and St Andrew's 'church in a school' in nearby Boothstown

eight years ago, after retiring early from a teaching career she loved. She inherited a thriving Messy Church and a 'fabulous' team of volunteers. By the time of the first lockdown Messy Church, led by volunteer Helen Wiles, was hugely popular, with 70 adults and children meeting once a month after school on Fridays in St Andrew's primary school.

'We had a nice problem,' Karen says, 'but we were struggling to cope with the numbers. We had a superb team, who were providing a hot meal cooked on the premises in a very tiny kitchen area.

'We've made real relationships with the vast majority of those families who came pre-Covid. A lot of them have been with us a long time and very much identified

Messy Church as their church, their family.'

But the numbers gave rise to concerns.

Karen knew that some potential volunteers were deterred by the sometimes chaotic feel of Messy Church, and she and her team were also worried that they weren't achieving the deeper spiritual dimension they had

'It feels like God has really intervened and has touched people spiritually in a new way.'

'What's surprising is the calm that there is now in Messy Church and how much more we're able to do. We've kept the same number of activities, but there's more time for people to go around and there's more time and quiet for the leaders to engage.'

She adds: 'It feels like God has really intervened and has touched people spiritually in a new way. We've had lots of tears – quiet tears and not so quiet tears. That was unexpected but a real blessing,

and it's taught me that this is the way we need to go.

'I do think that we need to meet once a month,

because that gives you continuity, so we need to look at the practical side of scaling up. I'm putting it all out to prayer. I have faith, it will happen. We might have some bumpy times, but Messy Church is far too precious to lose.



#### Time to rethink, time to pray

So, hard as it was, lockdown gave them time to breathe, time to think, and time to pray.

'As time went on, we made the firm decision that we would restart small,' Karen says. 'A number of our volunteers retired during lockdown, so we could accommodate up to 30 parents and children, and we would do one Messy Church each half-term. We were taking a bit of a chance, but we've had three sessions now and it has been fabulous; just incredible!

Listen to some Christmas songs and get everyone to choose their favourite to make a playlist to listen to in the run-up Christmas. Think about what the words in your chosen song might mean.

# Anna Chaplaincy and a bicycle made for two

A few months before our wedding, my (now) husband and I decided to go for a 'fun' tandem bike ride. We still laugh about it, 23 years later, and often recommend it to couples as valuable marriage preparation. On the back of the tandem, I had limited vision of the way ahead and minimal control

over the direction taken. I simply had to trust my beloved navigator.

Only a decade ago, Anna Chaplaincy was a small seed, planted in fertile Hampshire soil by Debbie Thrower and the local churches there. Anna Chaplaincy has flourished since being grafted into the BRF 'tree' in 2014.

#### Older people matter

As we come to the end of BRF's centenary year, the network has grown to 230 Anna Chaplains and affiliated members, and counting. In addition we have hundreds of Anna Friends all over the country, volunteers who quietly support an Anna Chaplain. Together, from the Orkneys to Truro, from Swansea to Lowestoft, they are proclaiming in word and deed, 'Older people matter.'

I have learned in recent months that, like my tandem experience, the growth of Anna Chaplaincy is neither under our control nor ours to direct. We see an increased awareness of our rapidly ageing society; we have been shocked at the brutal impact of Covid-19 on vulnerable older people; there's a growing recognition that the spiritual needs of older people are as important as their physical and emotional needs. Christians from across the UK want to get involved, inspired both by the needs they see in their own families, churches and communities and by the prompting of the Spirit.

#### A tipping point

We sense that we have reached an exciting moment in the growth of Anna Chaplaincy: a tipping point of interest in the spirituality of ageing and what it means to 'finish well'.

Who can see the way ahead? Who is directing us as we move forward into the unknown? The answer, of course, is our generous God, our beloved Navigator. And so, we continue to prayerfully listen for his voice, and trust him to direct our path. Thank you for journeying with us.

#### Never too late to volunteer



# Sharing the Christmas Story

It has been a real privilege to write for BRF, especially in this year of their centenary. My reflections have been written in response to the BRF vision of 'Sharing the Story', exploring what this means in the context of the Christmas story and the lead up to the 'start of it all', in a stable in Bethlehem. Before we share the wonderful news of Christ's birth with others, however, we must first inhabit it ourselves. This can be done by reading reflectively, praying thoughtfully and absorbing

the message of God's love for all people, so that it becomes part of our daily lives.

#### Promise, light, mystery...

In thinking how to enable people to do this, I decided not to go with the traditional chronological approach. Instead I explore each week one of the great themes of Advent and Christmas. Over five weeks, the book traces the concepts of promise, light, mystery, love, peace and hope, taking both familiar and unfamiliar stories from the Bible as my inspiration, but always with the

miracle of the incarnation at the heart of it all. My prayer for this book is that, as you journey with me through the days and weeks towards Christmas and beyond, you will gain new insights, a deeper understanding and a renewed engagement with the message of the gospels. Supported by these gifts, may you be encouraged to share the wonder of our Christian story with those with whom you share your lives, so that all may rejoice in the good news.

Lynn Goslin's story perfectly illustrates the lovely, sometimes unexpected, connections between BRF's various ministries and the relationships that are at the heart of all we do.


